Summary Guide

What is a Fence?

"Fence" is defined in the City Code as an artificially constructed barrier of wood, masonry, stone, wire, metal or other manufactured material, or combination of materials, that provides a boundary, means of protection, privacy screening or confinement.

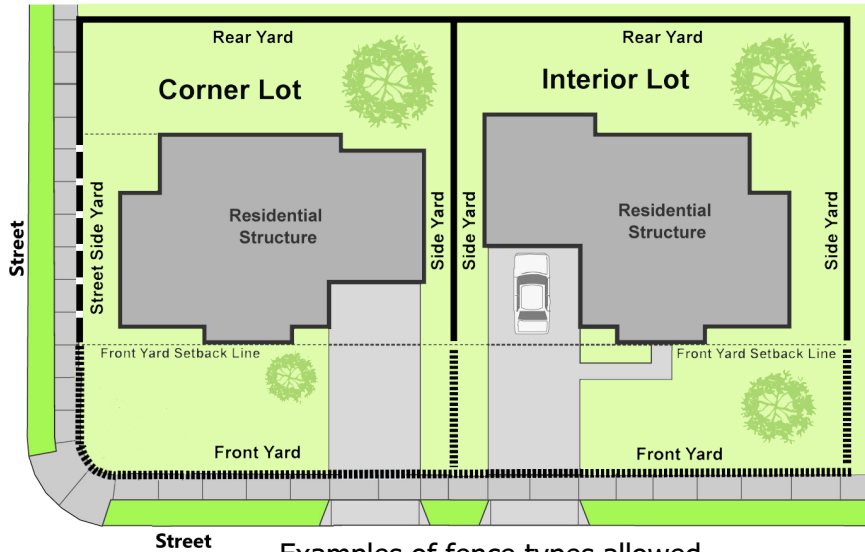


GUIDELINES

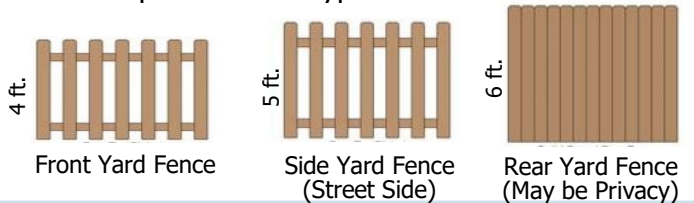
Fences must be constructed of chain link, wood, wrought iron, masonry, decorative wire, or composed of synthetic materials appropriate to the general character of the neighborhood and must follow each of these guidelines:

- Side & Rear Yard:**
 Maximum height is six (6) feet (see diagram at right).
- Front Yard:** May not exceed 4 feet in height & must be uniformly open to an extent equal to but not less than 50% of its surface area.
- Side yard street side:** a fence adjacent to any public street shall be no greater than five (5) feet in height and must also be uniformly open or perforated to an extent equal to but not less than fifty (50) per cent of its surface area;
- A fence should not impede sightlines for traffic on adjacent streets, alleys & drives.
- Fences using electrified wire, barbed wire or razor wire are not permitted on residential property.
- There is no limitation on height for fences in agricultural districts (zone A).

- 6 ft. (Rear and Side Yards)
- 4 ft. (Front Yards)
- 5 ft. (Street Side Yard)
